

in filling vacant Nurse positions is competing with the hourly pay of other healthcare providers. JCHD will be doing a salary market review in the next 12 months to evaluate whether the pay scales of MA, LPN, RN, NP need to be adjusted.

The JCHD Sexually Transmitted Diseases Program held a special clinic at the Treatment Court in Hillsboro on May 22. This clinic provided education, on-site testing options and referrals to all participants in the treatment court at two sessions that day. JCHD utilized the Foundation Grant to provide these services at this clinic for no charge to the clients. The JCHD Nurse coordinator for the Sexually Transmitted Diseases Program is Lisa Rhodes and she will be speaking to provide details of the event.

The Lead program at JCHD tested 18 children in May. Two of those results were slightly elevated but parents declined venous draws. Education is provided to all parents during an appointment for lead screening. We track the number of declines for lead testing monthly. We are happy to see that the number of declines for lead screening refusals has reduced from 25% to 9% over the past quarter. The reasons for denial for lead screenings vary from a time limitation and not wanting an additional procedure for the child. Marketing and advertising are helping to get the word out that JCHD is able to do lead screening and the importance of this screening for children. The JCHD clinic lead coordinator is currently





			managing 74 cases of elevated lead levels county wide.

Out of the 50 patients seen in May a total of 18 of those clients were new visits. The Nurse practitioner for this program was out on PTO for 6 days during this month and that created limitations on scheduling and seeing patients. JCHD has one Nurse Practitioner that sees clients through the mobile wellness program.

CLINICAL DASHBOARD UPDATES:

MEDICAL: Meetings were scheduled with the CureMD data team to review the new Dashboard application, Izenda 7, and build the reports and dashboard charts needed. Additional training is being scheduled for July to allow JCHD to complete future dashboard edits and builds.

DENTAL: Two additional training sessions were scheduled with Curve to understand reporting and dashboard functions for Dental through this platform.



GRANT/CONTRACT AWARDS:

JCHD was awarded a grant from the Jefferson Foundation in the amount of \$175,000 to address health equity and reduce barriers in healthcare in the county. The purpose of this grant is to ensure we can continue to provide direct client services to individuals in the community that have transportation, insurance, and economic barriers to care. This grant supports our mobile programs and ensures JCHD continues to have the appropriate staffing to serve individuals in the community. This is a critical part of public health in Jefferson County because the county has only one primary care physician per 4,310 residents. This is far below the state average of one provider per 1,420 residents. The funding will be allocated in the following manner for the timeframe of June 1, 2023, through May 31 2024:

COMMUNITY SERVICES BOARD REPORT JULY 22, 2023

The community services team includes: Communicable Disease, Environmental, Health Education and Public Health Preparedness

Current health advisories:

There is an outbreak investigation of Hepatitis A Virus infections involving frozen organic strawberries. Frozen strawberries were sold at Wal-Mart, Costco and HEB. Hep A symptoms or Illness usually occurs within 15 to 50 days after eating or drinking contaminated food or water. Symptoms of hepatitis A virus infection include fatigue, nausea, vomiting, abdominal pain, jaundice, dark urine, and pale stool. In some instances, particularly in children under the age of six, hepatitis A infection may be asymptomatic. Hep A is vaccine preventable. CDC recommends the following groups be vaccinated: children under 1 year, travelers, users of injections or illegal drugs, and/or people with chronic liver diseases, Hep B or Hep C. We also recommend food handlers receive vaccination.

St. Louis County Department of Public Health issued a health advisory warning against eating raw or undercooked Oasters. They have reported a death after consuming Oasters that were purchased from Fruit Stand and Seafood in Manchester. At this time, the concern is the bacteria vibrio vulnificus. Symptoms typically include fever, chills, a drop in blood pressure and skin blisters, usually appearing 12 to 72 hours after consuming shellfish but could take up to a week. It is estimated that 1/3 of individuals that are symptomatic will die.

State Contract updates:

Adult Brain Injury Service Coordination and Children and Youth with Special Healthcare Needs Service Coordination. (JCHD has 4 staff that provide service coordination for these two Missouri Department of Health and Senior Services programs.)

- The team continues to meet with providers in the region to try to increase support services for participants.
- Adjustment counseling was coordinated for multiple participants.
- Non-Emergency Transportation services coordinated to provide transportation to physician appointments.
- Participants were connected with dental services at JCHD.
- Participant connected with financial services to help with surgical expenses.
- Coordinated with Department of Mental Health to provide in-home modifications for participants.

Environmental Updates:

If residents have complaints or concerns about a food establishment or suspected food borne illness, they can access a complaint survey on the website and mobile application. Look under the "How do I...?" sections. JCHD follows-up on all complaints. We may not always follow-up with the individual that makes the complaint, unless we need additional information. We use a system called Citizen Serve. All residents can create a personal account. You can still submit the complaint anonymously. By creating the log-in, you will be able to log back in to see updates. For those that do not have access to the online submission, they can call the office. By calling the office, you will not have access to the updates.

REMINDERS FROM THE PREVIOUS MONTHS

As we enter into the summer season, our Environmental team will be conducting lodging inspections and Summer Food Service Program Inspections.

- We typically start lodging inspections after Memorial Day due to the opening of the outdoor pools. While in the facility we conduct sanitation, electrical and fire safety inspections.
- The Summer Food Services Program, a Missouri Department of Health and Senior Services (MO DHSS) program, provides reimbursements to schools and other community agencies to ensure children 0-18 have nutritious meals during the summer break. Our role in this program is to conduct food facility inspections.

JCHD Vector Control program.

- We have began spraying mosquito adulticide throughout unincorporated Jefferson County this week.
- The chemical we use kills the adult mosquitos and is sprayed from the back of agency trucks at a low speed, approximately 10 miles per hour. If you see the trucks going down the road at normal speeds, we are not actively spraying.
- We do have a contract with some of the smaller municipalities to conduct mosquito spraying within their city/town limits.
- Our spray crew begins spraying late in the evening, around dusk. This offers the best application of the spray product and ensures residents are not within the direct spray.
- We have a form on our website and mobile application for unincorporated residents to request us to spray in their area.
- We will also be conducting mosquito surveillance. This is a process of trapping/catching mosquitoes throughout the county. Once we collect them, we have equipment in our vector lab that can detect if any of the mosquitoes are carrying the West Nile Virus.
- West Nile Virus is transmittable to humans, through mosquitos. If we receive positive results, we will issue a press release and increase spraying for that area.
- This program also works closely with our Communicable Disease Team. If a resident of Jefferson County tests positive for West Nile Virus, we will increase mosquito spraying and surveillance around their home.

Communicable Disease cases are increasing as the weather warms up. (See the Communicable Disease Monthly Report)

- It is tick season, be sure to protect yourself, your family and your pets from ticks. Ticks, like mosquitos, carry viruses and bacteria that make us sick. Such as: Rocky Mountain Spotted Fever, Lyme-like disease, and ehrlichiosis.
- Proper food handling, storage and good hand hygiene is important to reduce foodborne illnesses. The typical "food poisonings" include e. coli, campy and salmonella. We do see an increase in cases as friends and families gather for barbeques and picnics.

Summer is fair and festival season.

- You will see our Environmental Public Health Specialists (EPHS) out conducting site inspections for Farmers Markets, temporary food event vendors and food trucks.
- Our Health Education Team will be providing information on healthy lifestyles, nutrition, the dangers of vaping, lead education, bike helmets and car seats.
- Our Adult Brain Injury and Children with Special Health Care Needs Service Coordinators will also be at special events offering program information and resource recommendations.



NOTES ON THE DATA:

- All data and information are conditional and may change as more reports are received.
- Case definitions are established by the Missouri Department of Health and Senior Services' (DHSS) Communicable Disease Investigation Reference Manual. The totals reflect the number of confirmed and probable cases reported; suspect cases are not included.
- Data is reported in epidemiologic weeks established by the CDC's Morbidity and Mortality Weekly Report (MMWR). The MMWR week starts on a Sunday and ends on Saturday. Values for MMWR week range from 1 to 53, although most years consist of 52 weeks. The 2023 MMWR calendar began on January 1, 2023.
- Case date may be based on the onset date, diagnosis date, specimen date, or test date.
- Excluded from this report are Sexually Transmitted Diseases, Influenza, and COVID-19.
- Jefferson County Health Department monitors all reportable disease cases year-round. Figures 1. and 2. include detailed views of diseases or conditions that may be of importance during the time of year this report is published. Variables such as outbreaks or the seasonality of communicable diseases may affect the number of cases per month and call for a more in-depth look. Seasonal change in the incidence of infectious diseases is common.

Figure 1. Campylobacteriosis Jefferson County, Missouri

Campylobacter infection, or campylobacteriosis, is caused by Campylobacter bacteria. Campylobacteriosis is one of the most common causes of diarrheal illness in the United States. There are 21 Campylobacter species; however, Campylobacter jejuni and Campylobacter coli are the two species that most often infect humans. Almost all persons infected with Campylobacter recover without any specific treatment. Antimicrobial therapy is warranted only for patients with severe disease or those at high risk for severe disease, such as those with immune systems severely weakened from medications or other illnesses. There were 2 cases of Campylobacteriosis reported during May 2023 in Jefferson County. During the previous 5 years, the number of cases has ranged from 0 to 8 per month. A year-to-date alert has been noted for Campylobacteriosis. Year-to-date alerts are present when the total cases in the current year are more than one standard deviation above the mean for the same time period in the previous five years.





Figure 2. Salmonellosis Jefferson County, Missouri

Salmonella are a gram-negative, rod-shaped bacteria which can cause illness in both animals and humans. Nontyphoidal salmonellosis (NTS) refers to illnesses caused by all serotypes of Salmonella (S.) except for S. Typhi, S. Paratyphi A, S. Paratyphi B, and S. Paratyphi C. There were 7 cases of Salmonellosis reported during May 2023 in Jefferson County. During the previous 5 years, the number of cases reported has ranged from 0 to 11 per month. There are two multi-state outbreaks of Salmonella currently active. An outbreak of Salmonella linked to raw cookie dough was posted May 23, 2023. Cases have been reported in six states, including Missouri. Public health officials are also investigating multistate outbreaks of Salmonella linked to contact with backyard poultry. Cases have been reported in 31 states, including Missouri. A year-to-date alert has been noted for Salmonellosis. Year-to-date alerts are present when the total cases in the current year are more than one standard deviation above the mean for the same time period in the previous five years.






JCHD Google Analytics Behaviors Overview

Overview of your user behaviors






